WELCOME TO THE BARNES MUSIC **FESTIVAL 2025**

We are delighted to present our programme for this year's Barnes Music Festival with the theme of Music & Literature, exploring how literature has shaped music and vice-versa.

We have an exciting programme of 36 events over two weeks at venues across Barnes. We open the festival with the Academy of St Martin in the Fields and a pre-festival talk by Sir Antonio Pappano. Later in the festival we host Opera Holland Park as well as Gesualdo Six and the Choir of King's College London.

Other highlights include the return of pianist Pavel Kolesnikov, this time playing with Samson Tsoy, and of Roderick Williams in a new programme accompanied by Andrew West. Alistair McGowan reprises the musical portrait of Erik Satie to mark his centenary and Gyles Brandreth joins with pianist Stefan Bednarczyk to present Shakespeare's Music. We close the festival with Elgar's mighty Dream of Gerontius.



Other top musicians include Jeneba Kanneh-Mason piano, Cordelia Williams piano with Tamsin Waley-Cohen violin, Tama Matheson actor with Clare Hammond piano with a reprise of Byron Don Juan, Richard Gowers organ, Helen Charleston soprano with Toby Carr lute, Harry Baker jazz trio and Henry Chandler violin with John Paul Ekins piano.

Our local groups Barnes Music Society, Barnes Choir, Barnes Community Choir and Barnes Concert Band bring their special performances to the festival and St Michael's is hosting a Come & Sing Dido & Aeneas conducted by Hilary Campbell.

We are pleased to have as our first Artist-in-Residence the exciting hornplayer Ben Goldscheider who is performing in the opening concert, adjudicating the Barnes Young Musician of the Year and giving his own concert with pianist Giuseppe Guarrera.

Our Schools Programme continues with the engagement of local primary schools, and our local secondary schools are hosting masterclasses for the best young musicians. We even have a Toddlers Concert for the very young.

We are grateful to all our supporters especially our principal partner Chestertons, our major partner Russell-Cooke, to the Benefactors and Friends of Barnes Music Festival and above all to the musicians who share their music and their passion with us. We hope you enjoy the festival!

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

Since 2016, Barnes Young Musician of the Year, in partnership with Barnes Music Society, has seen over 80 young performers reach the final adjudication. The 2025 adjudication is by international horn player Ben Goldscheider, Musician in Residence for the 2025 Barnes Music Festival, Goldscheider, an acclaimed soloist and chamber musician, also holds a professorship at the Royal Conservatory in Antwerp.

Leading up to the finals, masterclasses for piano, strings, woodwind and brass students are hosted by local schools, with top performers advancing to the final.

The winner will perform at the closing concert of the Festival on 29 March.



Internationally acclaimed violinist Tamsin Waley-Cohen has performed with orchestras including the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra and the Czech Philharmonic. She has also played at the Wigmore Hall and Concert gebouw with her quartet, The Albion Quartet. She is joined by pianist Cordelia Williams, who broadcasts regularly for BBC radio 3 and is known for

her remarkable understanding of the works of Schubert and Schumann.

Inspired by music Clara Wieck-Schumann played and loved, the pair bring an intensely romantic programme which is both virtuosic and intimate featuring readings of letters written by the composers, about and to each other.

Opening with Clara's exquisite first 'Romance', followed by Robert Schumann's volcanic second sonata. Mendelssohn is at his most touchingly lyrical in this Kreisler arrangement of his 'Song Without Words' and Tamsin and Cordelia conclude the programme with Schubert's late masterpiece, his Fantasie.

Ben Goldscheider (horn) and Giuseppe Guarrera (piano) present an exquisite evening of music. The programme begins with Beethoven's Sonata for Horn and Piano, Op. 17, featuring spirited dialogue between the instruments. Brahms' Four Serious Songs, Op. 121 follows, offering an introspective exploration of life and mortality. The first half concludes with Schumann's Adagio and Allegro, Op. 70, which moves from lyricism to joyful exuberance.

In the second half, Nachtstück, a contemporary piece by Mark Simpson, embodies a dark night charged with nervous energy. Schumann returns with Drei Fantasiestücke, Op. 73, a work of fantasy and melodic inventiveness. Roxanna Panufnik's Sonnets Without Words is inspired by Shakespeare's poetry. The evening concludes with Eugène Bozza's En Forêt, Op.4, a dazzling horn showcase.

CHAMBER RECITAL PURCELL SCHOOL

The Purcell School is based on the outskirts of London, in Hertfordshire, and is Britain's oldest music school. Entry to the School is based upon musical ability and potential, not upon background or ability to pay. The School's community is one of rich creativity and mutual support, and students regularly perform at concert halls across the UK, compete in international competitions and win scholarships to the best music colleges in the UK and abroad.

This recital showcases some of the finest young musicians from around the globe, with a programme of 19th Century chamber music including Walter Rabl's rarely performed Quartet for clarinet, violin, cello and piano, which was awarded first prize by Brahms in a Viennese competition in 1896.

Director of Music at St Mary's Barnes Ben Markovic brings together a trio of highly accomplished performers for a programme of Haydn and Schubert.

Both pieces are nicknamed 'Wanderer'. Haydn's trio was written in London in 1795 and is his best-known piano trio. Its first movement contains a number of Gypsy tunes and the rondo finale is in 'Hungarian' style.

Schubert's voluminous trio is one of Schubert's major compositions and has strong links with the poem Der Wanderer by Georg Schmidt.

The Zemlinsky Trio brings together three outstanding chamber musicians. Emma Abbate an amazingly talented pianist' (Musica) works with some of the finest singers and instrumentalists of her generation. Evva Mizerska, named 'rising star' by Strad is a highly sought-after award-winning cellist. Clarinettist Peter Cigleris enjoys a career spanning solo and chamber music, live broadcasts, recordings and concerto world premieres across the UK and abroad.

Beethoven's Clarinet Trio includes a theme and variations on a famous song from Joseph Weigl's opera L'amore marinaro (Love at sea). Mendelssohn's Three Pieces include arrangements of his Songs Without Words. Zemlinsky's Trio was highly regarded by Brahms, whose own lyrical work for the combination is an acknowledged masterpiece.

Classic FM rising star Jeneba Kanneh Mason made her debut at the BBC Proms at just nineteen with the Chineke! Orchestra. In the 2024/5 season she performs with the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra and the Oslo Philharmonic. Jeneba is releasing her first solo album as a Sony Classical Artist in Spring 2025.

Her sparkling recital programme begins with two Scarlatti Sonatas which demonstrate the composer's variety of styles, from lightness to emotional depth. These are followed by Chopin's Sonata no.2, considered to be one of the greatest piano sonatas of the literature. The second half opens with a pair of Chopin Nocturnes, followed by Scriabin's impressionistic Sonata No. 2. Finally, Jeneba presents a bold climax with Prokofiev's demanding Sonata no.7, subtitled 'Stalingrad'.

Henry Chandler and John Paul Ekins present a programme of three lyrical staples of the violin repertoire. The concert opens with Mozart's G Major Sonata, written in 1777, when the composer was just 21. The violin and piano are equals in a playful, vibrant conversation.

Chausson's Poème was composed in 1896 and tells the story 'Le Chant de l'amour triomphant' by Ivan Turgenev, which features two men of Ferrara - one a painter and the other a musician – who are in love with the same woman.

Brahms's G major Sonata is one of the most expressive instrumental works he wrote. It was composed during the summers of 1878 and 1879 and the composer used some poetic melodic material from two of his songs: 'Regenlied' ('Rain Song') and 'Nachklang' ('Reminiscence').


TONY PALMER FILM




